Community Partner of the Year City of Appleton

Pillars' 2023 Community Partner of the Year is the City of Appleton. The City has worked alongside Pillars to address the housing crisis and homelessness. Several of their departments invest meaningfully in our community's collective response in meeting the needs of our most vulnerable neighbors.

Between the Mayor's Office, Appleton Police Department, Community and Economic Development, and Public Health, the City makes a strong impact. They seek, share, and coordinate financial support to fund collaborative efforts with Pillars, Salvation Army, ADVOCAP, and Harbor House. They manage a centralized hub to connect people experiencing homelessness to housing solutions. When the need for expanded services was identified, the City took swift action and awarded two-year funding for service expansion. The list goes on.

As a human services organization addressing homelessness and housing insecurity, Pillars relies on community collaboration to make a lasting impact. The City has been a hands-on partner and strong advocate of Pillars' mission, earning the honor of Pillars Community Partner of the Year.



Highlights

These highlights are from Pillars' Fiscal Year 2023, which ran from October 1, 2022, to September 30, 2023.









October 2022

Winter Shelter Overflow Program

Thanks to funding from the City of Appleton, Pillars extended shelter capacity to house an additional 132 people from October 2022 to April 2023. The overflow program provided safe, temporary shelter and basic needs for individuals and families while they waited for a spot at one of Pillars' emergency shelters. This is a critical program during Wisconsin's coldest months.

December 2022

Seven Days of Service at Pillars Adult Shelter

The City also funded expanded hours of operation at Pillars Adult Shelter to include daytime hours on the weekends. This filled a gap in services providing basic needs and a place of respite seven days a week for adults experiencing homelessness.

March 2023

New Vision Statement

Pillars' new vision statement encourages a creative, compassionate community that collaborates to ensure episodes of homelessness are rare and brief, and that everyone has a place to call home. The change takes a noticeable shift from being Pillars-focused to communityfocused. This collaborative approach is necessary to address the housing needs in our community.

May 2023

321 Office for Street Outreach

Additional office space was created to provide the Pillars Street Outreach team the ability to work in a central downtown location. This location is key to meeting clients where they are at. Access to public transportation and other community partners makes it an optimal place for Street Outreach to operate.

June 2023

Adult & Family Shelter Bathroom Updates

Pillars received funding through the Wisconsin Housing and Economic Development Authority (WHEDA) to rehabilitate three bathrooms in Pillars Adult & Family Shelter. The project began in February and ended in June, repairing severely damaged floors and showers. These repairs gave Pillars clients a clean, safe environment to utilize on their journey to stable housing.

Marty's Story

Marty^{*} first came to the Adult and Family Shelter in February 2023 and resided there until May 2023 before moving to the Adult Shelter. She struggled with finding a job. She put in all the effort she could to find employment but was continuously unsuccessful.

In July of 2023, Marty was diagnosed with breast cancer. Somehow, she was able to keep her chipper mood despite her diagnosis. Marty's resilience in enduring chemotherapy while navigating housing instability was an inspiration to all. She worked with her Pillars case manager to get on SSI while still looking for employment. In late November of 2023, Marty's Social Security claim was approved.

Recently, Marty filled out an application for a Pillars Supportive Housing program, Single Room Occupancy (SRO), and was accepted. With the help of her case managers, Marty moved into her new home at the end of February 2024. Marty was extremely appreciative of the staff and stated that her case managers moved mountains for her. When leaving the shelter, Marty began to cry and expressed how grateful she is to have Pillars' case managers in her corner.

Her story perfectly encapsulates Pillars' value of collaboration. Pillars Adult Shelter, Stable Housing, and Supportive Service teams all collaborated to best support Marty as she moved into her new home. Pillars is grateful for our collaborative community partner, St Vincent de Paul, who supported Marty in making her room feel more like home with furnishings and décor.

Marty first came to Pillars with nothing. Now, Marty has a stable income, employment, a place to call her own, and a network of ongoing support as she continues her fight against cancer.



Pillars relies on multiple funding sources to sustain its mission. This diversity helps minimize the impact of changes outside our control. In fiscal year 2021 and 2022, Pillars received an influx of COVID-19 response funding. That revenue helped support added services and growing expenses put in place to meet the community's need.

Fiscal year 2023 saw COVID-19 response funding diminish. In addition, a challenging labor market caused higher than normal staff turnover. To keep pace with the market and inflation, Pillars increased compensation for frontline employees. While impacting our budget, this was a necessary decision. It is important that staff receive fair compensation for the challenging work frontline roles demand.

The 2023 deficit was covered by multi-year restricted gifts, proceeds from Pillars' endowment, and financial reserves strategically set aside from the surplus in fiscal year 2021. Pillars' leadership team and board of directors are at work to address the deficit and are planning ahead for future years. Your continued support is more important than ever as we look for new, collaborative ways to sustain this vital work.
